


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Lady Anne's Way

Lady Anne's Way is a classic long distance walk extending for 100 miles from the rugged limestone countryside of the Yorkshire Dales, to the unspoilt villages of the Eden Valley. The trail was conceived as a tribute to Lady Anne Clifford, who devoted her life to the restoration of her castles, churches and monuments along this route in the 17th Century. From Skipton Castle in North Yorkshire the path runs north to the ruins of Brougham Castle on the outskirts of Penrith. The Way takes in sections of the Dales Way in Wharfdale and the ancient green lane known as Lady Anne's Highway along Mallerstang, visiting Lady Anne's historically significant buildings along the route. The varied nature of this trail makes it appealing to both seasoned walkers and those seeking their first experience of a long distance hike. Starting with easy walking along the banks of the river Wharfe the route then takes a high path over the fells from Wensleydale into Mallerstang with its wild and dramatic scenery. Entering the Eden Valley the trail from Kirkby Stephen to Appleby is along soft flowing rivers leading through scenic villages on the way to Penrith.


Why do this walk?

- Walk through the wild and dramatic valleys of Wensleydale and Mallerstang in the Yorkshire Dales.
- Enjoy the scenic villages and lush pastures of the Eden Valley.
- Visit historically significant buildings along the way as the route travels between the castles of Skipton and Brougham.



Terrain: A mixture of wooded valleys, riverside paths, and remoter moorlands. A bit of everything the Dales and Eden Valley have to offer.

What's it like underfoot? The paths and tracks are reasonably well defined and maintained. Sections can be muddy in wet weather.

How Much Up & Down? The route climbs and descends on most days – with three days having up to 300m (1000 ft) of ascent. The maximum altitude is over 460m / 1800ft between Buckden and Askrigg.

Signposting: None. You will need to use your route description and map.

Navigation: The paths are well defined over most of the route, but you will need to be able to use a map and compass in case the mist is down over the moors. On some valley sections the route follows quieter, less travelled footpaths, which can be less well defined at times.

Weather: You may be lucky enough to encounter warm, dry weather over the whole route and enjoy dry paths and tremendous views, but you must be prepared because the weather can change quickly. Good clothing and waterproofs are essential!

Route

Wharfedale: Skipton to Buckden

The route starts at Skipton with its well preserved Medieval castle, the birthplace of Lady Anne Clifford. This section is dominated by the majestic River Wharfe

which you will follow from the imposing ruins of Lady Anne's Barden Tower to the tiny village of Buckden nestling at the foot of Buckden Pike. The trail wanders along by the side of the river before climbing high up onto the fell-side, entering limestone country with superb views across to Littondale and back down into Wharfedale. All along this section of the trail there are plenty of opportunities to buy refreshments in quaint teashops or cosy village inns.

Wensleydale: Buckden to Hawes

The trail leaves Wharfedale behind and crosses the moorland of Stake Allotments on part of an old roman road with stunning views across to Addlebrough. The path then drops down into Wensleydale, before entering the charming market town of Askrigg, famous for its use in the television series "All Creatures Great and Small". Now the path follows the River Ure through the quintessential Dales countryside to









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Hawes, one of the highest market towns in England.

Lady Anne's Highway and Mallerstang: Hawes to Kirkby Stephen

A dramatic section, this part of the path begins with a climb up onto Cotter End (500m). It then contours round on a ledge above the valley along the "Lady Anne Clifford's Highway". The path follows the headwaters of the River Ure until at Cumbria, or Westmorland as it once was. The trail then picks up the River Eden and descends into the dramatic Mallerstang Common with views across to the imposing Wild Boar Fell. Pleasant valley walking then leads you to Kirkby Stephen.

Upper Eden: Kirkby Stephen to Appleby

Meandering along in the Eden Valley, this is a section of gentle rambling but extensive views steeped in history. After Warcop the trail again follows the River Eden with easy walking through pleasant fields and meadows, to Appleby-in-Westmorland. Appleby is a delightful market town with a castle and keep, moot hall and tree lined green. It owes much to Lady Anne who repaired and maintained several of the buildings and built the charming almshouses. St Lawrence's Church with its cloister arches is worth a visit, as it is here that Lady Anne is buried.



Vale of Eden: Appleby to Penrith

A low level section with lovely vistas of the North Pennine Hills starting with a view up into High Cup Nick and its horseshoe of vertical Whin Sill crags. The trail passes through the timeless red sandstone village of Long Marton and then continues to Kirkby Thore with superb views towards Cross Fell and Wild Boar Fell. From here it is easy walking down to the River Eden once more and the picturesque Ousenstand Bridge, then past Whinfell Forest to Brougham Hall, and on to Brougham Castle. There are extensive ruins here of what was probably

Lady Anne's favourite castle, and where she died in 1676. Nearby is the Countess Pillar erected by Lady Anne to commemorate her mother. The path then meanders along next to the River Eamont and into the bustling market town of Penrith.

Additional Days

We can arrange extra nights at any of the overnight stops, allowing for rest days, or giving you more time to explore the locality. Here are some suggestions:











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Skipton

With its superbly preserved Medieval castle, cobbled streets and location at the southern edge of the National Park, Skipton is known as the Gateway to the Yorkshire Dales.

Skipton is a small, friendly country market town. The market is on 4 days a week. A pretty town to spend some time in, you can tour the well preserved castle, enjoy a boat trip along the canal, or explore the Victorian style shopping arcade.

Hawes

Hawes is a bustling market town, lying in the heart of the Yorkshire Dales National Park and surrounded by spectacular scenery. With many craft workshops, antique and speciality shops and restaurants on offer, it's the perfect place to spend a well-earned rest day.

This picturesque town is home to the famous Wensleydale Cheese and the renowned Dales Countryside Museum. There is still a rope-maker making ropes in the traditional way, and close to Hawes is Hardraw Force, England's highest singledrop waterfall. Visitors can stand on the bridge in the centre of Hawes and watch the Wensley tumble over the waterfall.

Kirkby Stephen

Kirkby Stephen is a traditional market town of historic buildings, cobbled yards, quaint corners and interesting shops. It is surrounded by a landscape of pastoral rural scenery and wild uplands. Being remote from large towns and population centres, Kirkby Stephen has developed a strong and self-sufficient identity and a vibrant sense of community.

Getting There and Away

General travel information for the Lady Anne's Way route will be in your holiday



pack including train and bus timetables where available.

Detailed instructions on getting to your first night's accommodation by car, or on foot from the nearest train or bus station, will also be included in the holiday pack on individual accommodation maps.

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Getting There:

By Air: The nearest airports are Manchester International (MAN) and Leeds Bradford (LBA). From Manchester you can take a train to Leeds and connect to Skipton from there.

By Public Transport: Skipton has a train station, and is easily accessible from the north and south via Leeds. There are trains from London, which take around four hours.

By Road: Skipton is situated in the Yorkshire Dales on the A65. The nearest city is Leeds (17 miles). There are National Express coach routes to Skipton.

Returning from Penrith:

By Air: There is a railway station in Penrith on the West Coast Mainline, where you can catch trains to airports: Manchester (approx 2 hours), 7 Scottish airports and Liverpool.

By Public Transport: You can take the train from Penrith to Carlisle, and from here it is easy to connect whether you are heading north, east or south. The train from Penrith back to Skipton takes around 2 and a half hours. Alternatively you could catch a bus to Appleby and then take the scenic Carlisle to Settle railway which continues on to Skipton.



By Road: Very close to the M6 motorway, Penrith is also served by National Express Coaches

This is the first half of the Lady Anne's Way, and the most dramatic section through the Yorkshire Dales which will suit those wanting to do the walk in 2 parts. Starting at Lady Anne's birthplace, Skipton Castle, the route follows the river Wharfe through picturesque limestone villages. The trail then takes a high route over the fells from Wensleydale into Mallerstang with its wild and dramatic scenery, finishing in Kirkby Stephen. This is the most challenging section of the Lady Anne's Way but with shorter days.

This is a delightful route that starts from Hawes along the Lady Anne's Highway in the Yorkshire Dales. The trail then leaves the rugged moorlands behind with easy walking along the river Eden through lush green pastures and picturesque villages to finish at Brougham Castle near Penrith. Despite distances being short, there is plenty to see with time to explore the villages, churches and towns enroute, or simply to take in the views along the way.
